





## **Introduction**

In this short book, we're taking a closer look at the milestone goals of Marcel Dionne's NHL career. But first, a little info about one of the greatest in the game.

## **About Marcel Dionne**

Marcel Dionne played 1,348 regular season and just 49 playoff games in the National Hockey League between 1971-72 and 1988-89 with the Detroit Red Wings, Los Angeles Kings and New York Rangers. He was the second overall pick at the 1971 NHL Amateur Draft, selected by the Red Wings. Guy Lafleur was the first overall pick going to the Montreal Canadiens. Many years later, the two would get a chance to play together with the Rangers.

Dionne had an outstanding junior career with the St. Catharines Black Hawks for three years from 1968-69 to 1970-71, totaling at least 100 points in each campaign. In his final two seasons, he led the OHA Junior A (now OHL) in scoring, earning the Eddie Powers Trophy. In 69-70, his 55 goals led the league with a four goal edge over runner-up Gilbert Perreault. His 132 points were eleven better than Perreault.

In his last year of junior, 1970-71, he scored 62 and assisted on 81 for 143 points in just 46 games. Surprisingly, he finished third in goal scoring, nine behind leader Rick Martin and eight behind runner-up Steve Shutt. He did have a six point edge over Dave Gardner for the overall lead.

Without any time in the minors, he jumped right into a starring role with the Red Wings as a rookie in 1971-72. Marcel scored 28 and assisted on 49 for 77 points. He was third in voting for the Calder Trophy as NHL rookie of the year behind winner Rick Martin and runner-up Ken Dryden.

With Detroit, he had his first of eight seasons reaching the 100

point plateau with 121 in 1974-75. This placed him third in the race for the Art Ross Trophy behind Bobby Orr and Phil Esposito. It would be the last year he would spend with the Red Wings.

A June 23, 1975 trade sent him to the Los Angeles Kings with Bart Crashley for Terry Harper and Dan Maloney. He spent 12 years with the Kings, putting up some pretty outstanding numbers. He was a 50 goal scorer six times, putting up a career best 59 in 1978-79. His 137 points in 1979-80 tied him for the league lead with Wayne Gretzky.

On March 10, 1987, Marcel was traded to the New York Rangers with Jeff Crossman for Bobby Carpenter and Tom Laidlaw. He finished out his NHL career with the Blue Shirts, retiring 37 games into the 1988-89 season.

Dionne's 731 career regular season goals rank him sixth all-time, ten behind Brett Hull. He is also sixth all-time with 1,771 points. Marcel was inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame in 1992. His jersey number 16 was retired by the Los Angeles Kings in 1990. At the time, it was just the second number retired by the team after Rogie Vachon's number 30 went to the rafters in 1985.

## **1971 2<sup>nd</sup> Overall Pick Comes Through In His 3<sup>rd</sup> NHL Game With 1<sup>st</sup> NHL Goal**

The first of 731 regular season goals scored by Marcel Dionne over his NHL career came on the night of October 16, 1971. The second overall pick by the Detroit Red Wings at the 1971 NHL Amateur Draft, behind just Guy Lafleur (Montreal Canadiens), went without a point in his first two games.

On this night, playing the Blues at the St. Louis Arena, things did not go well for the visitors. Detroit lost the game 9-2 and remained winless on the 1971-72 NHL season. However, it was a big night for Dionne.

At 4:59 of the third period, Marcel scored his first ever NHL goal, unassisted, on St. Louis goalie Ernie Wakely. It was one of two shots on net for Dionne and one of just 16 by the whole Red Wings team. In the Detroit nets, Al Smith faced a barrage of 51 shots, allowing the nine. The Blues had goals from eight different players with Wayne Connelly scoring two.

Dionne went on to score 27 more in his rookie 1971-72 season for a total of 28, one less than number one overall pick Lafleur. However, Marcel topped Guy in overall points 77 to 64. Of his 28 markers, seven were on the power play and two were game winners. Head to head, Dionne had four goals and three assists for seven points against the Canadiens while Lafleur had just two goals and an assist for three points against the Red Wings.

In that rookie year, Dionne also recorded his first of 29 NHL hat tricks. It happened against Lafleur and the Canadiens on March 19, 1972 at Detroit Olympia. He scored his 24<sup>th</sup>, 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> of the season, all on Montreal goalie Ken Dryden in a 7-6 win. His third of the game at 18:45, assisted by Nick Libett, stood as the game winner.

The impressive rookie performance got Dionne a look for the Calder Trophy as NHL rookie of the year. He finished third in

voting behind winner Ken Dryden of the Montreal Canadiens and runner-up Rick Martin of the Buffalo Sabres. Gilles Meloche (California Golden Seals) and Dave Burrows (Pittsburgh Penguins) were also in the running. Guy Lafleur was left out of the voting.

### **Dionne Scores Number 100 At The Aud Against The Buffalo Sabres**

Marcel went into the 1974-75 NHL season needing just eight goals to reach the 100 goal plateau. In his 21<sup>st</sup> game of the year, he made it happen on the road at the Buffalo Memorial Auditorium. Just like when he scored his first NHL goal against the St. Louis Blues, this milestone game ended in a Detroit Red Wings loss.

Dionne scored his eighth of the 1974-75 season and the 100<sup>th</sup> of his NHL career at 14:06 of the third period, the final goal of the game in a 5-2 loss. The goal was scored on Buffalo goalie Roger Crozier, unassisted, while Rick Dudley of the Sabres was in the penalty box for tripping.

Detroit managed just 19 shots on Crozier, four off the stick of Marcel Dionne. Jim Rutherford took a pounding in Detroit's end with 46 shots fired his way. The French Connection Line of Gilbert Perreault, Rene Robert and Rick Martin totaled seven points with Martin leading the way, scoring one and assisting on two.

Marcel had gone without a goal in the previous three games following a hat trick on November 20, 1974. That night, he scored his 5<sup>th</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> of the season while putting 13 shots on New York Rangers goalie Ed Giacomin. Dionne also assisted on Detroit's fourth goal of the game, scored by Danny Grant. The Red Wings lost the game 5-4.

In that 1974-75 NHL season, Dionne scored 47 goals and assisted

on 74 for 121 points. Ten of his goals were scored shorthanded, leading the league. He was third in the race for the Art Ross Trophy, 14 points behind leader Bobby Orr of the Bruins.

1974-75 was also the end of the Marcel Dionne era in Detroit. On June 23, 1975, he was traded to the Los Angeles Kings with Bart Crashley for Terry Harper, Dan Maloney and a draft pick. In his time with Detroit, Dionne scored 139 of his 731 career goals.

### **Marcel Dionne Nets 200<sup>th</sup> Career Goal But Kings Get Run Over By Minnesota**

A night after Dionne scored numbers 197, 198 and 199 in a game against his former team in Detroit, he reached the 200 goal plateau early in a December 28, 1976 match against the Minnesota North Stars. Marcel put one past Minnesota goalie Gary Smith at 4:35 of the first period, assisted by Gene Carr. This gave the Kings an early 1-0 lead but it wouldn't last.

By the time the first frame was done, the home team had a 3-1 lead and Dionne would not get on the scoresheet again. Powered by a pair of shorthanded goals by Tom Younghans and Bill Fairbairn, the North Stars took down the Kings 8-3 for just their seventh win in 35 games. Butch Goring and Dave Schultz rounded out the scoring for Los Angeles.

1976-77 was the first year Dionne topped 50 goals in a season. Interestingly, the 50th was scored against the same Minnesota North Stars. Number 50 was scored at 9:16 of the second period on Pete LoPresti, assisted by Butch Goring and Mike Murphy. Marcel had three goals in the game, two on LoPresti and one on Gary Smith. He added two assists for a five point night.

Dionne scored 53 goals that year, adding 69 assists for 122 points. He finished third in goal scoring, seven behind leader Steve Shutt of the Montreal Canadiens and three behind Shutt's teammate Guy Lafleur. The trio were the only players to surpass the 50 goal

plateau that season. Marcel was runner-up for the Art Ross Trophy, 14 points behind Lafleur. He won the Lady Byng Trophy for the second time and finished tied for fifth in voting for the Hart Trophy as NHL MVP.

### **Marcel Dionne Shuts Down The Atlanta Flames With Career Goal Number 300**

The Los Angeles Kings hosted the Atlanta Flames at the Forum on December 9, 1978 in a matchup between two pretty equal teams in the standings. The Flames got on the board first with Pat Ribble scoring on Mario Lessard just 41 seconds into the game. It would be the only goal Atlanta would score in the match.

Dave Taylor tied the score with his 14<sup>th</sup> of the season at 4:48 of the second period on Dan Bouchard, assisted by Dionne and Danny Grant. At 12:28 of the second, Marcel put his 21<sup>st</sup> of the 1978-79 NHL season and the 300<sup>th</sup> of his career past Bouchard on the power play, assisted by Grant and Butch Goring. This would stand as the game winning goal in the 5-1 win.

Marcel led the way that night with seven shots on Bouchard. The Kings put 42 on Atlanta's goalie while Lessard turned away all but one of 27 at the other end of the ice. Glenn Goldup, Rick Hampton and Bert Wilson had the other markers for Los Angeles.

In 1978-79, Dionne had a career high 59 goals. This was good for second in the NHL, ten behind Mike Bossy of the New York Islanders. His 130 points were just four off Art Ross Trophy winner Bryan Trottier, also from the Islanders. Marcel finished third in voting for the Hart Trophy behind winner Trottier and runner-up Guy Lafleur.

Dionne was, however, the recipient of the Lester B. Pearson Award, now known as the Ted Lindsay Award, for the Most Outstanding Player as selected by the NHLPA. It was the first of two consecutive seasons winning the award.

## **Dionne Dominates Canucks While Netting Number 400**

It took Marcel Dionne just 1:30 into a home game against the Vancouver Canucks to score the 400<sup>th</sup> goal of his NHL career.

On December 4, 1980, the Canucks were visiting the Los Angeles Kings at the Forum. Vancouver's Tiger Williams took a charging penalty just 39 seconds into the game. Marcel capitalized less than a minute into the power play with his 20<sup>th</sup> of the 1980-81 season and the 400<sup>th</sup> of his career. The goal was scored on Gary Bromley and assisted by Dave Taylor and Jerry Korab.

The Canucks got back into it, tying the game on a Per-Olov Brasar goal less than two minutes later. With the game just six minutes old, Marcel set up the game winner by Steve Jensen and also assisted by Korab. This was the third power play goal of the game.

In the second period, Dionne helped Dave Taylor cap the scoring for the night, also assisted by Charlie Simmer. The game ended in a 3-1 victory and Marcel played a part in all three markers for Los Angeles. The Kings were relatively easy on Bromley with just 21 shots. Six of those were off Dionne's stick, leading the team.

1980-81 was another big year offensively for Marcel with 58 goals and 77 assists for 135 points. This placed him second in goal scoring, ten behind Mike Bossy just like in 1978-79. In the race for the Art Ross Trophy, Dionne was a distant runner-up to Wayne Gretzky with 29 less points. He led the league in shots on goal for the third consecutive season with 342.

There was no denying Wayne Gretzky the Hart Trophy as league MVP. However, Marcel was relegated to third in voting behind goaltender Mike Liut of the St. Louis Blues. Dionne was named a Second Team All-Star at centre with Gretzky taking First Team honours.

The third best offense in the NHL still couldn't advance in the

Stanley Cup playoffs. Los Angeles had 337 goals for during the regular season, behind just the New York Islanders and St. Louis Blues. They tied the Buffalo Sabres for fourth overall with 99 points, just four behind the Norris Division leading Montreal Canadiens. Still, when they met the New York Rangers in the opening round, they lost three games to one to a team that was 25 points behind in the standings.

### **Milestones: Marcel Dionne Shines With 500<sup>th</sup> NHL Goal While Rest Of The Kings Take The Night Off**

On December 14, 1982, the Los Angeles Kings played the Washington Capitals on the road at the Capital Center. Marcel Dionne went into the game sitting at the 499 goal mark over his NHL career. This was the 4<sup>th</sup> game of what was a 1-12-2 run for the Kings. It certainly wasn't the one win over the streak.

Three minutes into the game, Marcel got the milestone goal out of the way, scoring number 500 of his career on Washington goalie Al Jensen. Jensen and Dionne would be teammates with the Kings for a short time in 1986-87. It was his 12<sup>th</sup> of the season, assisted by Ulf Isaksson and Jerry Korab.

Marcel scored number 501 unassisted at 6:31 of the second period but those would be the only two goals Los Angeles would score in the game, a 7-2 loss to the Caps. Dionne had eight of the just 21 shots on Jensen in the game. Leading the way for the Capitals were Dennis Maruk with a goal and two assists, along with Bobby Carpenter who had three helpers.

Dionne went on to score 56 goals in that 1982-83 NHL season. It was the last of six times he would surpass the 50 goal plateau. He placed fifth in the league that year, just a goal behind Michel Goulet. Marcel went on to score 731 over his NHL career, the sixth most all-time.

## **Dionne Scores His 600<sup>th</sup> Career Goal While In The Midst Of An Eight Game Scoring Streak**

1984-85 was a bit of a renaissance for Marcel Dionne. His point totals had been declining since he put up a personal best of 137 in 1979-80. After dropping below the 100 point mark in 1983-84 for the first time since 1977-78, he shot back to 126 for 84-85. It would be the last of eight times during his NHL career that Dionne would top 100.

He went into the campaign needing 17 goals to reach 600. He scored that milestone goal on December 15, 1984 at home against the Calgary Flames, his 30<sup>th</sup> game of the season. This was the second in a string of eight games with at least a goal and the second game of a productive four game stretch against teams from Alberta.

Two nights before, he had a goal and two assists against the Oilers. He had the same numbers in the 600<sup>th</sup> goal game against the Flames, two more goals against Calgary in the second half of a back-to-back and two more points against the Oilers in Edmonton a night later. In all, he had ten points in the four games.

On December 15, 1984 at the Great Western Forum, Dionne scored his 17<sup>th</sup> of the 1984-85 NHL season and the 600<sup>th</sup> of his career at 14:26 of the first period on Calgary goalie Rejean Lemelin, assisted by Dave Taylor and Mark Hardy. The goal was scored on the power play with Jim Peplinski in the box for interference.

In the second period, Marcel kept the offense going, assisting on a pair of Mark Hardy power play goals. The second of those two, scored with just eight seconds left in the period, remained as the game winner in a 6-5 Kings victory. The period had started in similarly quick fashion with Kent Nilsson scoring for Calgary just 12 seconds in. Nilsson completed his hat trick, scoring the only two goals in the third period.

Bernie Nicholls reaped the rewards of playing on a line with Dionne, finishing the night with four assists. Nicholls also led the Kings with five shots on net. Hardy and Jim Fox both had two goals and an assist each with Terry Ruskowski scoring the other goal for the Kings.

In reaching those 126 points, Marcel recorded eight 4-point games. A pair of those were against Wayne Gretzky and the Edmonton Oilers. In the race for the Art Ross Trophy, Dionne finished fourth, a distant 82 points behind leader Gretzky, nine points behind Jari Kurri and just four behind Dale Hawerchuk.

Also in a game against the Flames that year, Marcel recorded the last of his 29 NHL hat tricks. At home on November 19, 1984, he scored his 8<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> of the season, all on Calgary goalie Don Edwards in a 5-4 Los Angeles win.

### **Marcel's 700<sup>th</sup> Scored In Rivalry Game Between Rangers and Islanders**

1987-88 was the only full season Marcel Dionne played with the New York Rangers. Even then, he missed 13 games. He had come over from the Los Angeles Kings 67 games into the 1986-87 NHL season in a March 10, 1987 trade with Jeff Crossman that sent Bobby Carpenter and Tom Laidlaw to California.

Dionne went into 1987-88 needing just seven goals to reach the 700 goal plateau. Today, there are just eight players that have reached this milestone. In 1987, there was just Gordie Howe and Phil Esposito before him. Going into game eleven of the campaign, Marcel was at 699 and had just one goal over his previous five games after a rapid start to the season.

On October 31, 1987, the Rangers paid a visit to the New York Islanders at Nassau Veterans Coliseum for a Halloween game. For most of the game, it was all Islanders. The home team scored eight straight goals before the Blue Shirts finally got on the board

at 15:15 of the third period when Walt Poddubny scored his tenth of the season on Kelly Hrudehy. With time running out, it looked like Dionne would have to wait another game.

However, with just 33 seconds left in the match, Marcel put in his seventh of the year and 700<sup>th</sup> of his NHL career. It was a power play goal on Hrudehy, assisted by James Patrick and Bruce Bell. It was one of four shots he put on net in the game. The final score was 8-2 for the Islanders

In his 67 games with the Rangers that year, Dionne scored a respectable 31 goals while adding 34 assists for 65 points. It was the last of 17 times he would have at least 20 goals in a single season. 22 of the 31 markers were scored on the power play while four were game winners.

In his first game at the Forum in Los Angeles since being traded from the Kings, Dionne put on a show for his old crowd. On November 7, 1987, he scored his tenth and eleventh goals of the season on L.A. Goalie Roland Melanson while also assisting on a Jari Gronstrand goal for a three point game. It wasn't enough as the Kings edged the Rangers 5-4.

### **Rookie Marcel Dionne Scores 1<sup>st</sup> of 29 Career Hat Tricks Against Ken Dryden And The Canadiens**

In 1971-72, Dionne's first year in the NHL, he scored 28 goals for the Detroit Red Wings. Three of those were in a game on March 19, 1972 at Detroit Olympia against the Montreal Canadiens. In fact, his first two hat tricks were at home against the Habs. Throughout his career, he would have just one more three goal game against Montreal, in 1980 as a member of the Los Angeles Kings.

On this night, Marcel scored the first and last goals of the game. In between, the teams combined for another eleven markers. His first goal was scored 2:14 into the game, unassisted. Dionne's

second goal was scored at 8:29 of the third period, assisted by Larry Johnston and Nick Libett. This put the Red Wings up 6-4.

The two goal lead was not safe and Montreal struck for a pair of goals to tie the game at 6-6. At 18:45 of the third, Dionne scored his third of the game and 26<sup>th</sup> of the 1971-72 NHL season, assisted by Libett. This proved to be the game winner in a 7-6 Detroit victory. Marcel led the Red Wings with six shots on Dryden. The Montreal goalie faced a total of 36. At the other end of the ice, Andy Brown turned away 37 of 43 in the win.

Marcel would score just two more goals over the final six games of the season. However, in the team's next game after beating Montreal, he had a four assist night in Vancouver against the Canucks. He followed that up with his remaining two goals, along with two assists for another four point game, this time against the Los Angeles Kings. The result was eleven points in three games over a four day stretch.

The surge in scoring helped the Wings go 4-2-1 over their final seven games but it wasn't enough to get them into the post season. Detroit came up four points short for the fourth and final playoff spot in the East Division. If they were in the West, their 76 points would have put them in third place and into post season contention. Over his four years with Detroit, Dionne did not appear in the playoffs.

### **Dionne Has His 1<sup>st</sup> NHL Four Goal Game Against His Original Team**

Of his 29 hat tricks that Marcel Dionne scored during his National Hockey League career, three came with a bonus goal. He never scored more than four in a game. His first four goal game happened on January 13, 1979 at Detroit Olympia against the Red Wings, the team that drafted him second overall at the 1971 NHL Amateur Draft.

The Wings were dismal. To that point in the 1978-79 NHL season, Detroit had won just eight of their first 43 games. Things would not get better on this night. Dionne scored the first of his four goals on the power play at 7:36 of the first period to tie the score at 1-1. The goal was scored on former Kings teammate Rogie Vachon and assisted by Steve Jensen and Syl Apps.

The Kings took a 4-2 lead into the second period, a frame that belonged to Dionne. Marcel scored his 32<sup>nd</sup> and 33<sup>rd</sup> of the season to give Los Angeles a 6-2 lead. The first of the period was scored at 4:43 with assists to Randy Holt and Randy Manery. The second was at 13:43 from Robert Palmer and Manery.

Detroit clawed back with an early third period marker but that was all they'd get past Kings goalie Mario Lessard. Marcel finished up the scoring with his fourth of the game and 34<sup>th</sup> of the season with 27 seconds left in the game, assisted again by Randy Manery, along with Charlie Simmer.

Dionne's next four goal game came at the start of the 1979-80 season in Denver against the Colorado Rockies. He scored his 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> goals of the season and added an assist on a Dave Taylor marker for a five point night. The Kings won the game 7-4 and Marcel's third of the match was the game winner. Hardy Astrom was in net for all seven Los Angeles goals. Lessard turned away 37 of 41 in the win.

The third and final four goal game of Dionne's career was again against the Detroit Red Wings. In a November 11, 1981 home game, he scored his 17<sup>th</sup>, 18<sup>th</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup> goals of the 1981-82 NHL season. He also assisted on a Charlie Simmer goal for a five point total.

It was a bad night for Detroit goalie Corrado Micallef, and a short one for sure. Micallef allowed four goals on six shots over a 4:24 span, starting just 54 seconds into the game. He was replaced by Gilles Gilbert just 5:18 into the game. Gilbert allowed four more goals on 21 shots and the Wings lost the game 8-1. The Triple

Crown Line of Dionne, Charlie Simmer and Dave Taylor combined for eleven points in the game.

### **Dionne Scores His Final NHL Goal On Kelly Hrudey**

Marcel Dionne played just 37 games with the New York Rangers in his final NHL season, 1988-89. He added seven goals to his career total, scoring just a single goal over his final 16 games. His last goal, like his 700<sup>th</sup>, was scored against the New York Islanders at Nassau Veterans Coliseum.

On January 7, 1989, in his 30<sup>th</sup> game of the 1988-89 NHL season, Marcel put his 731<sup>st</sup> career goal past Kelly Hrudey at 3:02 of the third period, assisted by Ulf Dahlen and Brian Leetch. It was one of two shots Dionne had on net in the game. The Rangers won the match 5-1.

Interestingly, Guy Lafleur had an assist for the Rangers in the game, helping on a Kelly Kisio goal in the first period. Way back at the 1971 NHL Amateur Draft, Lafleur was the first overall pick by the Montreal Canadiens and Dionne was second overall going to the Detroit Red Wings. All these years later, the two legends were playing together for the New York Rangers, if only for that one season.

That year, Marcel would play in the minors for the first time in his career. He appeared in nine games with the IHL's Denver Rangers contributing 13 assists and zero goals. It was the first time he'd played outside the NHL since 1970-71 when he was a junior with the St. Catharines Black Hawks.
